Our 50th Annual Show: August 16, 17 & 18, 2013

We may have turned 50, but by no means are we over the hill; we're just getting started on the next 50! Our feature this year is Made in Wisconsin, and expectations are high for a really interesting, diverse, fun bunch of exhibits. Feature committee members have contacted or have been contacted by potential exhibitors with all sorts of items that were made in Wisconsin. In addition to the tractors, gas engines, steam engines, implements, vehicles and garden tractors, there are many more items that may show up: seed corn sacks, fodder cutters, advertising pieces, small electric appliances, radios, cookware, water rams, tools, snowmobiles, and that's just a partial list. Remember the Feature Building has all those locking glass cases now, so smaller items can be accommodated. We encourage exhibitors to set up in the Feature area, if possible. There will be special Made in Wisconsin exhibit information cards which can be used on exhibits all over the grounds, but we want to have a nice variety of Made in Wisconsin items in the feature area too. Call Pete (608) 635-7772 or Louise (608) 764-5563 if you want space in the Feature Building. Art Woodward (920)992-5149 will be taking care of the feature tractors.

To celebrate our 50th anniversary, some special items will be available. A free commemorative watch fob will be included in all exhibitor packs. There will be a limited edition 50th anniversary belt buckle featuring the Wisconsin tractor, and the Fuller & Johnson 20 hp gas engine. See p.6 for picture and more info. The Book Store will have hat tacks and a special 50th anniversary pin, made of the same materials as the hat tacks. They will also have show tee shirts and their new book, *Badger Steam and Gas Engine Club: 50 Year History*, (see p. 2 for details).

Although a motion was carried at the June meeting to allow golf cart rentals during the show, there are unresolved issues at this point which make that uncertain. Another change that will be implemented this year is **one way vehicular traffic in the flea market**. In response to a growing number of requests in recent years, arrangements for an ATM are in progress. It was decided the ATM will be located on the porch of the Office building. Remember too that there will be a Friday parade now. We did it last year, without much notice, but this year it is on our advertising that we have parades all three days of the show, at 2 p.m.

The next meeting on August 7 is the last meeting before the show. The **Jobs Board** is ready, so please put your John or Jane Henry in some category or other to help make the show happen.

Spring, 2013 Club Bus Trip

It was cold and windy at 6 a.m. in the Farm & Fleet parking lot on April 3, but turned sunny and nice later on. We got a bit of a late start, but we actually arrived at our first stop a little early. This was Scot Forge in Spring Grove, IL. They were very hospitable, and the tour was great. We saw some impressively large forgings, and workers manipulating heavy red hot metal pieces into the presses. It's an employee owned company and seems like it would be a good place to work, albeit there are long work days sometimes, and it can be hot work there in the summer. They offer good benefits, and really emphasize training and education for their workers - tuition reimbursements, incentive bonuses, and jobs apparently pay well. Our group had a lot of questions about the organizational aspects of the company, which I think surprised the Plant Manager who spoke to us. Perhaps since many of the questions were from the retirees in our group! We passed out the lunches in the parking lot, and headed off to Beloit.

We arrived at Fairbanks Morse early also. Vicki from Visit Beloit was very instrumental in getting us the tour of Fairbanks, and she met us there and came aboard the bus (to applause from our group!) and gave us a little pep talk and some anecdotes about Beloit. Among these tidbits was the fact that the Packers' first loss was to the Beloit football team - the Beloit Fairies. This was in 1919, the Packers were then known as "Big Bay Blue" and the "Fairies" were actually sponsored by Fairbanks-Morse. After this introduction, Security led the bus back into the complex and we all were signed in and issued a visitor pass, ear plugs and protective eyewear. At Scot Forge we wore hard hats, but we didn't need that at F&M. The group enjoyed the plant tour there too, and we got to hear one of the big engines they make running

on the test stand. The Fairbanks-Morse historical museum was also very nice.

After the F&M tour, there was trouble herding the guys back on the bus, so we were a little late getting back to Vicki at the Stone Water Tower and Water Pumping Station. She understood, and even remarked about herding cats. The water tower is actually pretty impressive when viewed up close. The walls are 6 feet thick at the base, made of limestone of course. The pumping station is a cute Shingle style brick building, which I remember seeing many times when passing through that area. It was empty for quite a number of years, but has now been restored and spruced up. The entire small park has new fences, paved walkways, and a nice but tiny parking lot. A group does plantings at the Pumping Station in the summer months. It's across from the larger Riverside Park, which has also been improved and is more aesthetically pleasing than formerly. Vicki gave a brief talk about the history of the building and the water utility. The place is so small she had to divide our group of 56 into three parts. There was a Dairy Queen next door, so even though supper was only an hour away, some people went over there for a treat, and we stood around talking for a while outside. Then we piled back on the bus around 4:30 or so and headed over to eat supper. At least people were hungry enough that it was easy to get them back on the bus that time.

We ate at the Hometown Buffet (previously Old Country Buffet) in Janesville. There are certainly a lot of choices, so everyone could find something to eat. Then we were back on the bus again, and heading home. Several of the guys told me they thought this year's trip was the best ever, but I hear that from some of them every year. And people were starting to ask about next year's trip too. I've got a few ideas yet. I would like to do this for at least 3 more years, to make 10 trips in total. A nice even number.

The trip did turn a profit this year, as we had a full bus. There are no pictures from the bus trip again, as neither Scot Forge nor Fairbanks-Morse allowed cameras.

2013 Swap Meet Report

In spite of a rainy Friday, and mud for Saturday, the Swap Meet did pretty well this year. There were 265 vendors, fewer than last year's 292, but the weather on Friday was probably at least partially responsible for that drop. The auction lasted a lo-o-ong time, but finally got done. There was no shortage of engines and other items this year.

Food sales were also down, but the Swap Meet still turned a nice profit. One of the stoves died, and hallelujah, we bought a brand spankin' new one! The suggestion was made at the May meeting that we should buy another new one next year to replace the remaining old one, and I think I speak for everyone who has ever worked in the Food Stand, when I say YES, do it! The stoves have been the source of a lot of problems from the beginning.

The lines at the Food Stand were pretty short this year, and there were fewer complaints about cold food, etc. The famous Klemm brownies were sold out by Saturday afternoon, and pie sales were also brisk. Actually, most of the food was sold out by late Saturday afternoon. The 4H groups did a great job for us once again. And there was cleanup help in the late afternoons, so the main workers in the Food Stand were not totally flat out exhausted this year – maybe only halfway there??
