

#### February 22, 2015 = Annual Meeting

Once again, St. Paul's Lutheran Church is the site of the annual meeting. There is parking behind the church, and the meeting room is handicap accessible from the parking lot. The door will be open around 1 p.m., with the meeting starting at 2 p.m. There is an official meeting notice/financial report included with this newsletter, and driving directions, the agenda and the Club calendar are also on that sheet. Please bring it with you for reference during the meeting.

Normal business at the annual meeting includes consideration of all fees e.g. gate admission, flea market space rents, shingle price, etc. The flea market vendor fee increase voted on last year will be up for reconsideration this year. The Railroad Committee will present a progress report. Other business may be introduced from the floor. Club Bus Trip information will be announced.

When the business meeting is done, election of officers will be held. All incumbent Club Officers have indicated their willingness to continue in office. #### **Badger Steam and Gas Completes Land** Acquisition

Article by Joe Prindle published in the Baraboo News Republic The Badger Steam and Gas Engine Club announced Dec. 17, 2014 the purchase of an additional 118 acres for its show grounds on Sand Road in Delton Township, bringing the total holdings to 264 acres. The additional property will allow for expanded parking, flea market and exhibitor areas during the club's annual show, held two weekends before Labor Day. Other events held on the site include a swap meet in May and kid's day, when area fourth graders are invited to learn about agricultural history.

#### Fall Bus Trip: John Deere & Sistine Chapel

O.K. That title probably got your attention! This bus tour is available from Able Trek Tours of Reedsburg. This is not a Club trip, but I thought it might be of interest to Club members. It is a day trip, on Tuesday, October 20. The cost is \$96 per person, including lunch. First on the agenda

is a tour of the John Deere Tractor Cab and Assembly Plant in Waterloo, IA. Tractors being assembled will include 6R, 7R, 8R/8RT and 9R/9RT. This is a trolley tour, so there will be very little walking. There will be time to check out the John Deere gift shop. Also planned is a visit to the brand new John Deere Tractor and Engine Museum. Another stop will be Kenny Kass's private collection of rare tractors which includes prairie tractors, Rumely Oil Pulls and Waterloo Boy and John Deere tractors. Mr. Kass does not open his collection to the public, so this is a special opportunity. Where is the Sistine Chapel, you wonder? Lunch will be at the Galleria de Paco Restaurant where artist Paco Rosic has recreated the Sistine Ceiling using 5.200 cans of spray paint. Pickup points for the tour will be in LaValle, Reedsburg, Baraboo, Sauk City and Spring Green. The tour is limited to 45 people. I checked with Able Trek shortly before the newsletter went to the printer, and 13 people had reserved. They have a reasonable cancellation policy. He was born in 1920, the son of Sylvester and Marguerite (Mellinger) Coates of Waseca, MN. The family moved to Madison shortly after Lyle's birth. He graduated from Madison Central High School. In 1941, he married June Kinsman, and they were married for 70 years. Soon after their marriage, he joined the U.S. Army and was a paratrooper in the 11<sup>th</sup> Airborne Division. After the war, he worked for Wisconsin Power and Light Company, where he remained until his retirement. His career required several moves over the years, but he lived in Baraboo for the past 38 years. He was a member of the Club since 1983. #### Member Meeting Reports: November 20, 2014

About 30 people were present. President Coates called the meeting to order. There was a thank you and donation check from the Yellow Thunder Amateur Radio Club for use of the Feature Building. They will come again in 2015, the week after our show. Member news included three new members, and the death of Ray Knicker in October. Bill Klemm reported the purchase agreement has been signed for the purchase of the 118 acres of adjacent land. Our current site will be appraised on Monday, and closing will be in the first or second week of December. The loan will be for 15 years at 4.5%. Neal Stone reported timber sale prospects. The Market is good now. There are at least 4 bidders, and there will be a meeting with the highest bidders on Monday. David Fuller said the Railroad Committee is moving rail donated by Findorff, and recently purchased a rail tongs for moving the rails. Flea marketers are asking that the price not be raised in 2015. This must be decided at the annual meeting. The Ayers windmill damage will be repaired by Peter Young, estimated cost \$600. Paul Grotophorst reported that base materials, plates, etc. are needed for the Fairbanks engine, cost estimated at \$300. MC. There was a complaint that the Feature Building is mess, and space is being wasted. It needs to be cleaned and reorganized when the weather is warmer.

#### January 21, 2015

About 36 members and guests were present. After the meeting was called to order, the Secretary Holzman read minutes of the November meeting, and also two Board meetings, regarding the land purchase and timber sale. The Club will place a sign on the new parcel recognizing the previous owners. Membership Secretary Crystal Hasheider reported 3 new members, and 4 deaths. A Nominating Committee was selected, including John Anderson, Robert

Mattson, Tom Ripp and Jim McGhee. Bill Klemm reported on the progress of the logging operation: 56 truck loads have gone out, poles and oak logs are still there, and it is about half done. The shower trailer will be invited back for the show. Louise Coates reported that the spring bus trip is still a work in progress. She also informed members of a fall trip offered by Able Trek, and a plan to reduce mailings of the newsletter. Mark Beard said the auctioneer would like to start the Swap Meet auction at 10 a.m. instead of 11 a.m., due to the amount of items to be auctioned. John Anderson wants to get a group together to complete the fencing between the parking lot and the grounds, due to the addition to the grounds.
