

Steve Roudebush: Giving the Past a Future

Those of us who have known Steve for a long time remember the days when he was a gas engine man. So what triggered his move to the "other side" - steam engines? He says that from a young age he actually had an interest in steam engines. His son Tyler went to Steam School in Rollag, Minnesota, and this inspired Steve and his daughter Kayla to go to Edgerton for Steam School. He had always wanted a steam engine, and a few years ago, he finally acquired a 1922 Minneapolis 20 hp steamer which required a lot of work. In other words, it was in pieces.

The restoration took him from December, 2012 to show time the following year, which is actually quite a short time for such a large project. Steve is a guy who gets things done. He repaired the boiler and everything else. At the show that year, the engine was in the parade, ran on the Baker fan, and participated in the spark show. Steve being Steve, the engine was meticulously restored and beautifully painted. The story goes that at that first show, he was very diligent for a while keeping everything spotlessly clean, when he finally realized that it was a steam engine, and they are supposed to be black and oily.

Steve is a long time member, and the Roudebush family is well-represented in the Club. He and his father Glen both joined in 1982. Glen passed away in 2006, but Steve's son Tyler and daughter Kayla have both joined the Club. Sons Nick and Danny are also interested in the hobby, and Steve's wife Joanne is very supportive of his participation as well.

A story about Steve would not be complete without mentioning his business, Spec Machine. Steve is one of a fairly sizable number of machinists in the Club.

In 1997, he started Spec Machine in an old hog barn, and has been in business ever since, doing custom work in his job shop. He works on old things, and also on new, very high tech items. He will be fixing the Print Shop's press that was broken at last year's show. Currently he is working on Alco locomotive #1385 for the Mid-Continent Railway Museum. It will be a complete locomotive when it leaves his shop. The shop is well-equipped and very organized. Even the dog only barks when visitors arrive, then stops barking and retires to her house. Without being told. Remarkable!

Future plans? He has a recently purchased, very large 1918 Minneapolis 36x56 wooden separator in the shop that needs work. Only 377 were made. It will probably be ready for the 2016 show. (No pressure or anything, Steve!) He wants to find a steam engine for Kayla, and he is also looking for a Minneapolis tractor. Whatever he adds to the family collection will have a very good home and be carefully preserved.

John A. Kukuwich Jr., age 82, of Waukesha died October 23, 2015. For most of his life, he farmed in Franklin, WI, working with his brother Robert and his parents, John and Hattie (Dostal) Kukuwich. He continued this legacy with his wife, Marge and his daughters. In the late 1970s, Marge started Leaf and Petal Greenhouses and John worked with her in this endeavor. He was also an owner of General Aluminum and Prime Supply, both home improvement companies. He joined the Club in 2002. He was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his wife of 56 years, Marge (Smith) Kukuwich; his daughters Karyn (Mike) Conklin, Connie (Tim Moriarity) Kukuwich, and Kathy (Tom) Tabbert; grandchildren Michelle (Aaron) Michael, Glenn, Kyle, Kristyn, Ross, Alex and Ryan; great grandchild Taylor; brother Robert (Elaine) Kukuwich: aunt Molly Heidlbach and uncle Albert Dostal.

Howard C. Larsen, age 82, of Baraboo passed away on December 27, 2015. He was born to Howard and Laura (Wolkow) Larsen in 1932 in Shell Lake. He came to the Baraboo area at an early age when his family moved to a farm on Happy Hill near North Freedom. He left home at age 13 to work for various farmers in the Sauk Prairie area. During the Korean Conflict, he joined the Air Force and began his many travels. He met his first wife, Lynden Alden Larsen, in South Dakota. They were married 51 years, until her death in 2003. They lived on several farms in Wisconsin, finally buying a farm in Baraboo in 1969. He spent the next 46 years as a farmer and trader, buying and selling tractors and machinery throughout Wisconsin. He became a member of the Club in 1997. In late 2005 and 2006, two life changing events occurred. He met his second true love, Donna Scherbert, and he had a tractor rollover accident which

severely crippled him, but he managed to overcome the odds. He and Donna married in 2008. He is survived by his wife, Donna; his five children, Carla, Eugene (Mona), Kathy (David) Ott, Janet, and Howard Jr. (Dawn); grandchildren Matt (Lindy), Emily, Anastasia, and Ben Larsen; great-grandchildren Jorja, Aaron and Oliver Larsen; Donna's five children and their families whom he considered his own.

Richard Shoudy, age 86, of Rockford, IL died Tuesday, September 1, 2015. He was born in 1928 in Rockford, the son of Emil and Nellie (Kellstrom) Shoudy. Richard was a graduate of East High School, and served in the Army National Guard in Korea. He married Velma Kramer in 1959. He was employed by Elco Industries for 36 years, working as a Product Engineer. He retired in 1992. A member of the Club since 1983, he enjoyed collecting and restoring gasoline engines, and vacations were planned around showing his engines at the Baraboo show. He is survived by his wife Velma; children Carolyn, David (Deb) and Steven (Jean) Shoudy; granddaughter, Crystal; step-grandchildren, Jason and John (Laura) Kovanda and Bernadette (Steve) Simard; step greatgrandchildren, Olivia, Sophia, Jason and Henry; sister Elinor (Roy) Mohler; sister-in-law, Janet Kramer; other relatives. He was preceded in death by his parents and brother-in-law, Ray Kramer.

Robert A. Strubel, age 57, of Reedsburg passed away Thursday, December 17, 2015. He was born January 21, 1958 in Milwaukee, the son of Edward "Eddie" Strubel and Loretta (McCauley) Strubel. He joined the Club in 1991, and enjoyed antique cars and tractors, and working on them with his father, who was also a Club member. He was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his wife Suzanne; children Dan (Mari) of Portage, Matt, Rob (Chelsey), Jenny, and Emily of Reedsburg; grandchildren Alexander, Aaron and Jaxson, and the dog, Daisy.

Victor Herbert VanAlstine, age 68, of Rio died on Thursday, December 3, 2015. He was born on September 29, 1947 in Marshfield to Louis Bernard and Juliet Helen (Gulrud) VanAlstine. He attended Norway Grove grade school and graduated from Waunakee Area Schools in 1966. He was united in marriage to Patricia Curtis in 1974. He served in the U.S. Navy on the aircraft carrier USS Oriskany during

the Vietnam War. He was employed as a steamfitter welder at Mendota Mental Health for 38 years. Don Blausey reported the Club's fire extinguishers are mounted and tagged as inspected. The Railroad Committee reported an additional load of rail is to be delivered this week, and another load will be delivered this month. The Club will pay for the concrete and electrical service to the building. A motion was made by Don Evenson to continue the Saturday evening banquet, with Steve Roudebush coordinating this even. Profit from this will be used to pay for restoration of the Club's 1885 Rumely steam traction engine. Some steam engines have been offered to the Club; Bill Klemm and Paul Young will check on it. Neal Stone had information on a timber sale, possibly in the fall. Allen Steele displayed plans for the building by the construction machinery demonstration area; it will be going up this spring.
